# MINUTES OF THE 2006 ANNUAL MEETING

# Monday, November 13

Registration continued from 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and a continental breakfast was served from 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m.

CAS President Paul Braithwaite opened the business session at 8:00 a.m. welcoming everyone to the meeting and announcing that the meeting would be Webcast over the CAS Web Site. Mr. Braithwaite went on to thank the Program Planning Committee for developing a great program of sessions.

Mr. Braithwaite announced the special guests in attendance including Dr. James Garven, President, American Risk and Insurance Association; Shewak Gidwani, Secretary General, Insurance Institute of India; and Nobuyuki Chiba, Representative, Institute of Actuaries of Japan.

Mr. Braithwaite introduced Jim MacGinnitie who gave the address to the new members.

Mr. Braithwaite asked for a round of applause for the 34 percent of members who volunteered this year. He then announced the winners of the lifetime achievement award for volunteer service, the Matthew S. Rodermund Service Award, Richard J. Roth Sr. and Richard J. Roth Jr. Richard Roth Sr. served on the Committee on Professional Conduct, the International Relations Committee, the Long Range Planning Committee, and several research committees. Richard Roth Jr. was also a stalwart contributor to the research function through service on several research committees. He also contributed to the Long Range Planning Committee and several task forces.

Mr. Braithwaite then announced the recipients of the Above & Beyond Achievement Award. Rudy Palenik served as a volunteer on the Research Paper Classifier Project. Volunteers were asked to classify 25 articles in 60 days. Mr. Palenik, who has been on the committee since June 2005, has classified 3,069 abstracts with the new CAS Research Taxonomy as of June 2006.

Richard Goldfarb was recognized for his contributions to basic education. He serves as a consultant to the Syllabus Committee for Exam 8 and was primarily responsible for the creation of the detailed learning objectives for that exam. For the 2006 Syllabus, he filled a need for a comprehensive study note on valuation by writing a paper. He also delivered a study note on risk-adjusted performance measurement for inclusion on the 2007 Syllabus.

Nancy Watkins was recognized for her work with a project of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners. She coordinated the project in her role as chair of Committee on Property and Liability Financial Reporting. She has spent almost 1,000 hours advancing critical issues for the actuarial profession.

Vice president—research & development, Roger Hayne, announced The Charles A. Hachemeister Award which was established in 1993 in recognition of Charles A. Hachemeister's many contributions to Actuarial Studies in Non-Life Insurance (ASTIN) and his efforts to establish a closer relationship between the CAS and ASTIN. The year's winner was William H. Panning for his paper "Measuring Loss Reserve Uncertainty." Mr. Panning later presented his paper at the meeting.

Next, the Dorweiler Prize, which commemorates the work of Paul Dorweiler, was announced. It is awarded for the best paper submitted each year by an Associate or Fellow who attained his or her designation more than five years ago. This year's winners were Richard E. Sherman and Gordon F. Diss for their paper "Estimating the Workers Compensation Tail." The paper was presented later at the meeting.

Mr. Hayne noted that the paper will be published in the 2005 *Proceedings*, which is the last issue with peerreviewed papers. The refereed papers will be published in the future in the new CAS Journal. The name of the journal is *Variance*, and its tagline is "Advancing the Science of Risk." The first issue of *Variance* will be published in spring 2007.

Mr. Braithwaite then asked for a moment of silence for members who have passed away during the past year. The members were Norman J. Bennett, Clyde H. Graves, James C. Hickman, Nathan Ford Jones, Charles David Kline Jr., Allie V. Resony, Paul J. Scheel Sr., Barbara A. Seiffertt, Luther L. Tarbell, John A.W. Trist, and Paul D. Wilbert.

Mr. Braithwaite recognized two contributions to the CAS Trust, which was established in 1979 as a non-profit 501(c)(3) organization to afford members and others an income tax deduction for contributions of funds to be used for scientific, literary, research or educational purposes. First, the Midwestern Actuarial Forum has donated \$10,000 to the Trust. D.W. Simpson and Company donated \$10,000 bringing their lifetime contribution to the Trust to \$110,000.

Al Beer, who currently serves on the Board of the Actuarial Foundation, was introduced by Mr. Braithwaite before he gave an update on the Foundation. Mr. Braithwaite also welcomed the President of the American Risk and Insurance Association, Doctor James Garven, who gave an overview of ARIA.

Pat Woods, the chair of the Program Planning Committee, told attendees that there were 30 different concurrent sessions at the Annual Meeting. The general sessions address proposed broadening of the qualification standards in the U.S., Risk Transfer, Lloyds, and Catastrophes. The concurrent sessions covered a wide array of topics including a separate ERM track, a general business skills track, and three papers all dealing with different aspects of loss reserving—measuring loss reserve uncertainty (the Hachemeister Prize paper), stochastic reserving techniques (found in the paper from the 2006 Reserve Call Papers), and handling long-tailed lines.

The social event of the meeting would be a buffet dinner and entertainment at McCormick and Kuleto's Seafood Restaurant in Ghirardelli Square from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. Mr. Woods also informed the audience of the games and festivities to support achievement in mathematics at the Actuarial Foundation's charity event to be held from 7:30 to 10:30 p.m.

Mr. Woods thanked his vice chair, Annette Goodreau, the rest of the Program Planning Committee, Carrie Rice, and the other members of the CAS Office Staff for putting together another wonderful CAS meeting.

Mr. Myers then discussed the White Paper on CAS Education Strategy.

After Mr. Braithwaite gave his Presidential Address, Mr. Myers thanked Mr. Braithwaite for his service as the president. Mr. Braithwaite presented Mr. Myers with the gavel and Presidential Medallion. He then officially closed the business session.

Mary Frances Miller President, Select Actuarial Services

At a luncheon from 12:00 p.m. to 1:30 p.m. the featured speaker was Joey Cheek, Speed Skating Olympic Champion. A native of Greensboro, NC, Joey Cheek grew up as an inline skater and made the switch to the ice in 1995. He began his ice career as an "Allround" or distance skater but later switched to the shorter sprint distances, where he fulfilled a lifelong dream at the 2006 Olympics in Torino, Italy, winning a gold medal in the 500 meters and silver in the 1,000 meters. Cheek's many charitable donations and volunteer work help him to shine off the ice. Most notably, Cheek supports the Right To Play organization, an athlete-driven international humanitarian organization that uses sport and play as a tool to help young people in the most disadvantaged areas of the world. He has also taken an active role to bring awareness to the genocide-striken Darfur area of Sudan, which earned him a spot on *TIME* magazine's 100 Most Influential People list.

# Monday, May 8, 2006

Registration was held from 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

A continental breakfast was served at 7:00 a.m. before the business session, which was opened by CAS President Paul Braithwaite at 8:00 a.m. Mr. Braithwaite welcomed everyone and announced that the meeting was being Webcast over the CAS Web Site. He then introduced the members of the CAS Board of Directors and Executive Council.

Mr. Braithwaite went on to introduce the past presidents of the society in attendance including Ronald L. Bornhuetter (1975), Stephen P. D'Arcy (2005), Patrick J. Grannan (2001), David G. # ADDRESS TO NEW MEMBERS-MAY 8, 2006

#### PATRICK J. GRANNAN

Good morning. I want to congratulate each of the new Associates and Fellows on a tremendous accomplishment. You deserve every bit of the applause just given to you and then some.

There's another group of people who deserve special recognition. I'd like to suggest a hearty round of applause, especially by the new Associates and Fellows, for their spouses, children, parents, and others who helped them, cooked for them, kept quiet for them, and may, in a couple cases, have even had to put up with them while they were studying.

For the new Associates and Fellows, this is obviously an important milestone in your career. Like other milestones, it is a dividing point between a road that has been traveled and the road ahead.

It is very tempting for someone in my shoes to try to give some advice to someone in your shoes about the road ahead. After all, I was in your shoes 28 or 30 years ago and feel there are a lot of useful things I've learned about the road. You would be right to point out that the road you're going to travel will be different than mine. On the other hand, the world hasn't really changed that much, at least if when it comes to fundamentals. In any case, I've got the microphone and you appear to be listening, so I hope you will indulge me for a few minutes. I will limit myself to two pieces of advice, which I hope you will find helpful.

I've had the pleasure of knowing quite a few actuaries over the years. My first piece of advice comes from observation of them and of what has worked well or poorly for me in my own career. I believe a real key to an enjoyable and satisfying career, both financially and professionally, is to have a genuine interest in your work and real curiosity about everything related to it. People I've known who clearly had real interest in the work they were doing and the surrounding business context (and you could tell this from how they talked about their work) obviously enjoyed it. They also developed a deep understanding of both their immediate work and the related business issues. They became real experts, the people that others would go to solve a problem or lead a team to solve the problem.

So, if you accept my observation, how do you go about getting to do work that interests you? Well, you will be making choices as you proceed down your particular road. Most will be small forks in the road while others will be major roadblocks, opportunities, or roadblocks that turn into opportunities, which is something that happens surprisingly often. In making your choices, I encourage you to give more weight to the question of which types of work interest you the most, than to the visible financial differences.

A somewhat less obvious way to get to do work that interests you is to recognize that it's largely a matter of your own attitude toward whatever work you happen to be doing. Almost any actuarial work can be very interesting if you approach it right. Most actuarial work involves thinking and problem solving of one sort or another. Given that you chose to take all those exams and actually passed them, it's a safe bet that you are very good at thinking and solving problems. It's also a safe bet that you enjoy it, unless you are a masochist, in which case I suppose you still enjoy it in a way.

My second piece of advice is to remember that the rest of your career will be a lot longer than the projects and other issues that are at the top of your mind at any given time. This observation has real implications for choices you will face, assuming you want to maximize your enjoyment and financial well-being over the long run rather than just the immediate future.

One example of immediate interest is what will you choose to do while you're here at the CAS meeting? If you are using this meeting as a rest stop with family or friends, go right ahead—you owe it to them. However, if that's not the case and you are tempted to go back to your room and watch TV or get some work out of the way, rather than go to a session or the reception tonight, I encourage you to think twice. You would be missing a valuable opportunity. You might be thinking that a particular time slot doesn't include any sessions related to your work or that there won't be many people you know at a reception or dinner. That is when I want you to remember that your current work and the people you currently work with are just one section of the road. There will be many other sections that you can't anticipate. It is amazing how often a topic that was being discussed by other actuaries but seemed nothing more than a curiosity to me at the time, turned out to be important at a later point. Similarly, there's a lot of long-term value in getting to know even a small number of people at this meeting. The actuarial world is small enough that you will run into some of the same people again in different contexts—you could be looking for a job or for help on a project, or the other person might be. It's surprising how relationships have come back to help me later in ways I didn't anticipate. I also made quite a few good friends.

Another example—one that takes more time and effort but has an even bigger payoff—is participating in the profession's activities. In the short run, writing a paper or giving a presentation at a meeting or working on a CAS or Academy committee costs you time and effort, without much obvious benefit. In my own case, it has turned out to be immensely helpful in ways I didn't expect. I looked at the list of current CAS Board and Executive Council members as a sample of people who have been around the profession a while. Out of those 22 people, I have had at least one non-CAS business interaction with 11 of them in the course of my career. I was surprised that the number was so high and thought it might be a biased sample, so I looked at the lists of people who got their Associateship or Fellowship in the same years as I did. It turns out that I've encountered about a third of them outside my CAS activities. In most cases, I worked with them or had occasion to review their work or vice versa. If you get to know ten actuaries moderately well by working with them on a committee, I think the odds are that somewhere down the road you will encounter a couple of them, and will find it helpful that you already know them. The reason again is that your road will have many sections beyond the one you are on today. For the same reason, the knowledge you gain by writing a paper or working on a CAS committee will be valuable in ways beyond the purpose you might have in mind. There have been a number of times in my career when I decided to invest some time in learning about a topic, whether on my own or by participating in a committee. More often than not, the purpose I had in mind, such as offering some consulting services, didn't pan out. None the less, in most cases, the knowledge I gained turned out to be valuable years later in different contexts than I'd pictured.

My third and final example has to do with integrity. You will encounter situations where it may seem like it would be better for you or your employer if you were to do something less than honestly. You really don't want to do that. Not only is it contrary to Precept 1 of our profession's code of conduct, but it likely will be noticed by others. Having a reputation as a straight shooter will be extremely valuable to you on all those future sections of your road. I'm happy to say that in my experience, actuaries are almost universally people of very high integrity. You can be proud to be a member of this group.

Again, congratulations. I wish you the very best in your career.

# ADDRESS TO NEW MEMBERS—NOVEMBER 13, 2006

#### W. James MacGinnitie

It's a challenge to distill and extract what I've learned in the 45 years since I sat where you are, and to transmit it to you in the few minutes allotted me. First, I offer my congratulations on your accomplishments.

I thought I might start with a little humor, so I Googled "actuarial humor" and got approximately 91,300 results in 0.13 seconds. I leave it as an exercise for the student to see if there are any new jokes there.

I'd like to begin with some "pearls" that I have heard at actuarial meetings such as this. The one that goes back the furthest is from a CAS meeting here in San Francisco in 1982. The keynote speaker was Thomas Sowell, a noted economist from the Hoover Institution, and an occasional *Forbes* columnist. He observed that, "There are no solutions, only tradeoffs." Many times in your business and professional affairs, and in your personal life, you will be looking for the perfect solution. It usually doesn't exist, and you have to accept a balanced solution—one that makes tradeoffs. "There are no solutions; only tradeoffs."

The second is LeRoy Simon's address to new members in 1999, in which he observed that, "It is harder to be an actuary than to become one." His remarks should be required reading, and the basis for discussion, at our professionalism course. Every practicing actuary should reread them from time to time, and ponder his insights. He elaborates on the theme in several contexts, but the one I would emphasize today is the need to put the public interest, and the interest of your clients, both direct and indirect, ahead of your own. This will happen several times in your career, and it will help to remember that, "It is harder to be an actuary than to become one."

My final "pearl" this morning is from an American Academy of Actuaries meeting, in remarks by the guest speaker, Rabbi Harold Kushner—perhaps best known as the author of *When Bad Things Happen to Good People*. Speaking broadly on professionalism, he said, "There is no right way to do the wrong thing." Again, there will be several times in your career when it will be helpful to remember the rabbi's words, "There is no right way to do the wrong thing."

Now, with apologies to David Letterman, I'd like to turn to the top 10 things I've learned about casualty actuarial work.

- 1. The world is not normal. Beware of people who always want to use the normal distribution. It may be easy to manipulate mathematically, but unfortunately real-world experience doesn't follow it in many important situations.
- 2. The tail is longer than you think.
- 3. The tail is fatter than you think.
- 4. The world is not linear. Linear correlations are easy to manipulate, but in several important areas, the relationships are better modeled by copulas, particularly when dealing with two or more simultaneous adverse events. In a crisis, the correlations can approach unity.
- 5. Greek letters do not connote wisdom and understanding. The ancient Greek philosophers were wise and understanding. But current day geeks who "talk" in Greek letters (some even made up) often don't understand the underlying realities.

- 6. Lake Wobegon is a theoretical construct. A book of business where all the risks are better than average will often be presented to you; don't fall for it. If it seems too good to be true, then it probably is. As Professor Paul Embrechts and other authorities on risk management have admonished, "Understand your winners."
- 7. You know less about the historical experience than you think. It may be because all the claims haven't been paid, or even presented. It may be that the world has changed in ways that are not yet manifest. And sometimes the data is just plain bad, albeit in a subtle way.
- 8. "The map is not the territory." (This phrase is attributed to Alfred Korzybski.) Our models have become increasingly sophisticated, but they are still only models of the underlying real world. Choosing the wrong model or using the wrong parameter values is unfortunately common.
- 9. The world is more volatile than you think, or than you like. An honest confidence interval is often too wide to be useful, and acceptable, to your client, or to a regulator, or to an auditor.
- 10. Innumeracy is widespread. And a particularly important form, the lack of understanding of probability and all that flows from that concept, including uncertainty and risk, is common. It is encountered often in politicians, lawyers, underwriters, and accountants.

You face a future of unprecedented opportunities. None of this would be possible without the selfless work of generations of actuaries who have gone before you. You are the beneficiaries of that work, and so as you now receive your Associateship or Fellowship, you must also assume the many responsibilities that go with the designation:

- The responsibility to continue your education throughout your professional career;
- The responsibility to extend the intellectual capital of the profession through your research, both practical and theoretical, and through the dissemination of your results in papers and meetings such as this;
- The responsibility to recruit and educate the next generation of actuaries;
- The responsibility to conduct your affairs in a professional and ethical manner, and especially to recognize your fiduciary obligation for the financial soundness of the organizations you serve, with their promises to provide protection and payments far into the future.

The accomplishment that you celebrate, and for which we recognize you today, is a very substantial one. You and your families and colleagues can be justly proud. Decades from now, when you look back to today, we trust that you will take as much pride in the way that you have conducted your professional career as you do in today's achievement.

Thank you for permitting me to be part of your celebration.

# Norman J. Bennett 1924–2006

Born on October 1, 1924, Norm Bennett grew up in Boston, Massachusetts. While attending Harvard University during World War II, he was drafted into the Army. He studied meteorology at Amherst College and worked in Brazil for 18 months sending out weather reports by Morse Code to the Army Air Corps.

After his discharge in 1946 as a sergeant, Bennett worked in the Azores for a year before returning to Harvard, graduating with a degree in mathematics in 1948. That year he also met his future wife, Janet, on a blind date. He later took actuarial classes at the University of Iowa and worked as an actuary for the Massachusetts Division of Insurance before moving to Tallahassee, Florida, to become the state's deputy insurance commissioner.

Bennett earned his ACAS in 1953 and his FCAS in 1956. In 1958, Bennett settled his family in Boonton, New Jersey, and commuted to Continental Insurance Company in Manhattan for the next 22 years. In 1980, he and John Muetterties (FCAS 1956) established Muetterties Bennett Associates, in Mountain Lakes, New Jersey. In 1985, he left that company to work for Armco Steel in Cincinnati, Ohio.

Bennett contributed a great deal to the CAS, serving as the Examination Committee General Chair (1962–1968), on the CAS Executive Council (1969–1970), and two terms on the CAS Board (1971–1972 and 1976–1979). He was very involved in the association newsletter, *The Actuarial Review*, serving on its Editorial Committee (1979–1980). In 1974, he began writing a column for *The AR* called "Maunderings," which contained his humorous observations on the actuarial profession. Other service to the CAS leadership and committee sincluded Education and Examination Committee Chair (1962–1968); Representative on the Joint Committee on Review of Education and Examinations (1968–1970); Education and Examination Committee Consultant (1969–1973); Textbook Committee (1970–1973); Committee on Levels of Certification (1971); and the Long Range Planning Committee (1975–1976).

In 1992 he received the Matthew Rodermund Service Award, which recognizes CAS members making significant volunteer contributions to the actuarial profession. Bennett was also a *Proceedings* author, writing "Statistics for Rating and Research" (1960) and a discussion on the paper "Ratemaking for Fire Insurance" by Joseph J. Magrath (1959).

In 1999 he retired with his wife and returned to Boonton where he indulged his interest in historic preservation. He visited Civil War battlefields with history buffs he had met and eventually became president of the Boonton Historic Preservation Commission. He enjoyed crossword puzzles and keeping in touch with his old classmates.

Bennett died on April 20, 2006. In addition to his wife, he is survived by a son, Peter Bennett; daughters Alix Bennett, Amanda Bennett, and Kathryn Bennett; a sister; and three grandchildren.

# James C. Hickman 1927–2006

James Hickman, ACAS 1959, was born in Indianola, Iowa, on August 27, 1927. He graduated from Indianola High School in 1945. He received his bachelor of arts degree at Simpson College before earning a master of science degree in mathematics with an emphasis in actuarial science and a doctorate in mathematical statistics at the University of Iowa. During summer vacations in high school and college, he enjoyed working for the U.S. Forest Service as a fire ranger in Idaho.

He began teaching at the University of Iowa in 1951. In 1972, Hickman became a professor emeritus of business and statistics at the Madison School of Business at the University of Wisconsin. He served as dean of the school from 1985 to1990 and put into effect changes that are still in place today. He retired in 1993.

A noted researcher in the field of actuarial science, Hickman won the 1981 and 1984 Halmstad Prize of the Actuarial Education and Research Fund for best contributions to actuarial science literature. He received the business school's 1985 Erwin A. Gaumnitz Distinguished Faculty Award for outstanding teaching, research, and public service. He was also active in the Society of Actuaries, serving on numerous committees and the board of governors.

Hickman served on the Consultants Panel on Social Security to the Senate Finance and House Ways and Means Committee and the Actuarial Standards Board. He volunteered his time on the Congressional advisory committees on Social Security funding and served on the boards of the Blue Cross Blue Shield of Wisconsin, United Wisconsin Services, and the Presbyterian Church (Board of Pensions).

Hickman wrote the paper "Funding Theories of Social Insurance," which was published in the *Proceedings* (1968), along with a response to a discussion on the paper (1969). Hickman also wrote a book review for the *Proceedings* on "Mathematical Methods in Risk Theory" by Hans Bühlmann (1960).

Hickman enjoyed the outdoors and, into his 70s, he led hikes in Colorado, bicycle tours, whitewater rafting trips, and cross-country ski outings.

He passed away on September 10 at the age of 79. He is survived by his wife of 56 years Margaret (McKee); children Charles, Donald, and Barbara; four grandchildren; and one great grandson.

# Nathan Ford Jones 1917–2006

Born on August 1, 1917, Nathan Jones earned degrees from Princeton University and New York University of Law. He served during World War II in the U.S. Army and the U.S. Office of Research Development. He became an FSA in 1942, an ACAS in 1952, and a member of the American Academy of Actuaries in 1965. He had a long career at Prudential Life Insurance Company, starting in 1938 and retiring in 1981 as the assistant vice president. Not content to retire, he continued to work from 1981 to 2001 at the New York State Insurance Department. He was a member of the Mathematics Advisory Committee at Princeton. Jones was active in his church choir and a member of the Diocese of Newark Finance Committee.

Jones died on September 19, 2006 in Upper Montclair, New Jersey.

# Charles David Kline Jr. 1956–2006

Born on October 6, 1956, Charles (Chuck) Kline attended Lebanon Valley College in Annville, Pennsylvania, where he earned a bachelor of science degree in actuarial science and accounting in 1978. He earned his ACAS designation in 1985 and became an FCAS in 1990. At the time of his death he was vice president and actuary for GEICO with responsibility for the actuarial reserving department in Washington, D.C. He began working for GEICO in 1978 as an actuarial assistant. He was promoted to senior actuarial assistant in 1981 and an actuarial analyst in 1983.

In 1985 he and colleague Marty Adler (FCAS 1969) coauthored "Evaluating Bodily Injury Liabilities Using a Claims Closure Model," which was published in the 1985 *CAS Discussion Paper Program*. The paper is now part of the CAS Syllabus for Exam 6. He served the CAS as a member of the Examination Committee from 1992 to 1994 and as a Part Chairman of the committee from 1995 to 1998.

Kline passed away suddenly on October 22 at the age of 50. He is survived by his wife, Shirley V. Kline; and his sons Charles D. Kline III and Stephen P. Kline.

# Allie V. Resony 1921–2006

Born in Hartford, Connecticut on April 24, 1921, Allie Resony attended Trinity College where he earned a degree in 1943. During World War II, he served in the U.S. Army Air Corps. He became an Associate of the Society in 1952 and a Fellow in 1955. He worked for the Hartford Insurance Group, retiring in 1980 as an associate actuary. His paper "Allocated Loss Expense Reserves," was published in the 1972 *Proceedings*.

He passed away on October 12, 2006. Resony is survived by his three children, John Resony, James Resony, and Judith Kelly; his companion, Barbara LaRosa; and four siblings. He is predeceased by his wife Elsie (Kindle) Resony and three siblings.

# Barbara Ann Seiffertt 1949–2006

Barbara Seiffertt was born on July 23, 1949. She attended St. Louis University in St. Louis, Missouri where she graduated with a bachelor of arts degree in mathematics in 1971. She was a member of Phi Beta Kappa and Pi Mu Epsilon, a mathematics fraternity.

In January 1972, Seiffertt made her home in Bloomington, Indiana, where she began working for State Farm Insurance corporate headquarters. She enjoyed teaching Sunday school at Bloomington St. Patrick's Church. Her last position at State Farm was pricing manager. She earned her ACAS designation in 1976.

Seiffertt died on April 20, 2006 in St. Louis. She is survived by her daughter, Andrea Jo Seiffertt; her father, Eugene T. Seiffertt; her brother Tom Seiffert; and her niece and nephew, Lacey Lee and Daniel Cole Seiffertt. She is predeceased by her mother, Norma Jean Schaetzel Seiffertt.

# Luther Lawrence Tarbell Jr. 1929–2006

Born November 19, 1929, in Hartford, Massachusetts, Luther Lawrence Tarbell Jr. was one of the founding editors of *The Actuarial Review*. He earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Connecticut in 1951 and served in the U.S. Army for two years after that. He became an Associate in 1956 and a Fellow in 1958. He worked as an actuary at Traveler's Insurance Company for over 35 years, retiring in 1990 as vice president of property/casualty and chief auditor of reserves.

In 1967, Tarbell wrote a discussion concerning the *Proceedings* paper "Underwriting Profit in Fire Bureau Rate" by Laurence H. Longley-Cook. Other contributions to the *Proceedings* include the paper "Automobile Physical Damage Ratemaking" (1959) and a discussion to "Multiple Coverage Experience Rating Plan" by Eldon J. Klaassen (1960).

Tarbell served on the Editorial Committee from 1964 to 1969 before becoming chair of the committee from 1970 to 1975. In 1966 he volunteered on the Committee on Annual Statement. From 1970 to 1973 he served on the Committee on Review of Papers; from 1972 to 1977 he was a consultant to the Education and Examination Committee; from 1977 to 1978 he served on the Committee on Financial Reporting. He was also very involved with the *Proceedings*, compiling two *Indexes*, one in 1965, covering Volumes XLI to L and one in 1974, covering Volumes LI to LX.



# KEEP LEARNING!

#### **Paul Braithwaite**

Last year, at the Annual Meeting in Baltimore, I provided you with a brief review of goals for my year as president. I appreciate this opportunity to discuss what we have accomplished this year, and to offer some comments on my views of the CAS and what might lie ahead.

My comments today will revolve around the theme of learning. In my view of the world, learning is an important passion that drives us as individuals and as an organization.

In the words of the father of the Japanese post-war industrial revival, Dr. W. Edwards Deming, "Learning is not compulsory... neither is survival."

That is an important lesson. Let me continue with another important lesson I have learned in recent years: I love volunteering for the CAS! Let me see if I can say that any more clearly—I love volunteering for the CAS!

Sure it involves sacrifices, particularly as president, and yes, there were times when the word "survival" entered my mind this year! There were many instances when I wished to be in two places at once, or sometimes three, and my availability to my family, my boss, and my clients was limited. However, it is truly inspiring when I look around and see our 1,400 volunteers, all of whom are making similar sacrifices. And yet, because they care about the future of our profession and our organization, these volunteers make it a high priority to work on behalf of the profession, contribute ideas, and express opinions. And there is no doubt that some of members enjoy expressing opinions, particularly those volunteers who have been elected to our board of directors! It could easily drive you crazy, but in general I love that about our board, our other volunteers, and our members. Take, for example, a CASNET posting earlier this year related to the new 15-minute reading period on exams. This was posted at 12:43 p.m. one Wednesday afternoon, and by the end of the day, there were two dozen postings. Within a week or two, there were about 60 postings. It is inspiring that our members care so much!

Now let's turn to some of the important goals that our board of directors set for me in the past year.

First, we established a goal to clarify our vision of the desired role of the CAS and its members in the developing field of enterprise risk management, or ERM. The resulting report painted a vision of CAS members being leading ERM experts for insurance organizations and important contributors to the modeling process for other types of organizations. The report also reaffirmed our need to continue the many areas of activity we have initiated over the last few years, including our active involvement in the Joint SOA/CAS Risk Management Section, and our support of ERM-II, the ERM Institute International. I am pleased to report that we now have an ERM Committee of our board, and we have implemented an ERM review of the CAS itself, which will demonstrate our capabilities as well as help ensure the future success of our organization.

Another goal addressed our governance process by implementing the conclusions of our Governance Issues Task Force. This resulted in a successful ballot initiative in this year's elections to implement two important changes. First, our executive director is now an official member of our executive council, recognizing the important role our professional staff now plays. Second, our board now has the opportunity to gain more outside perspective by appointing three additional board members in addition to the members elected by our Fellows. Our initial plan is to appoint the VP-casualty of the American Academy of Actuaries and one nonactuary. A task force is working to identify the nonactuary and have them join the board next May.

My goal related to education was addressed through extensive deliberations of our board, culminating in the recent White Paper on CAS Educational Strategy, as already discussed by Tom Myers. I will only add that education is one of our central missions, including continuing professional development. Nothing is more important in my mind than our efforts to improve our syllabus and study materials and our efforts to offer a rich tapestry of learning

opportunities for our members through a variety of delivery mechanisms. In the last few years, our professional development offerings have evolved to include both hands-on modeling activities and Web-based courses. We must continue to expand in these directions.

Another important activity this year was the work of the Critical Review of the U.S. Actuarial Profession, or CRUSAP, Task Force, led by Fred Kilbourne. Sponsored by the American Academy of Actuaries, this independent task force reviewed the actuarial profession in the U.S. This effort was successful, as the draft report issued in October identified a number of areas of opportunity to improve our profession with a particular focus on our ability to serve the public. Our board recently commented on the draft report, and we look forward to a final version by year end.

The final goal I would like to discuss is our goal to clarify our international strategy, in order to focus resources and activities. Why is this important? Why is this necessary? Well, first of all, we have a long list of potential activities that could advance the casualty actuarial profession throughout the world. Second, we seem to have many divergent opinions currently among our members. Some actuaries focus on the fact that they have worked on the same line of business in the Midwest for 20 years—so why should they care about what's going on outside the U.S.? Many others have not only worked for international organizations, but they have also lived and worked in other countries. Let's consider some statistics, as I know you like numbers!

I would like to start with where we fit in the world arena. We as actuaries now represent a substantial profession, with 40,500 fully qualified actuaries in 94 countries. A significant portion—more than 7,000—today focus on casualty or general insurance, and of those 4,362 are now members of the CAS. Given recent trends, I expect the number of general insurance actuaries to continue to grow faster than the total population. For example, the recent Vision 2020 report in Australia found that, "2006 is the first year in which there are more candidates doing the general insurance exams than life insurance, making general insurance now the most popular discipline at this profession entry point." In a moment, I will touch on some of the reasons there is such a demand for general insurance actuaries in Australia.

But let's first consider the CAS when I became a member 25 years ago. I was member number 944. Now, I have to admit that I did not actually know it at the time, since I only received a certificate—no bright blue T-shirt with a big 944 on it—but I did know that I was joining a profession that was already well-established, with quite a long history. I distinctly remember the old-timers telling me we were getting quite big, and it's just not like it used to be when you could go to a meeting and everyone would know each other. So as number 944, I certainly felt I was joining a substantial and important profession.

We now have 539 CAS members who live and work outside the United States. By themselves, they are not as numerous as the CAS I joined, but in a few years they surely will be. And they, along with other general insurance members of our sister organizations, enrich our profession in so many ways. We learn invaluable lessons though the opportunity to observe other cultures, as well as other insurance products, regulatory processes, and analytical techniques.

For example, just south of our borders in Mexico, I learned earlier this year that there are 3,000 actuaries currently working in banking and finance. Wouldn't it be interesting to find out more about how they apply their skills in these fields? I worked with the CAS office this year to conduct a global survey of actuaries in banking and financial management, with 22 organizations responding. We found that Mexico is the leader, but they are not alone—over 10 percent of actuaries in Australia, Japan and the U.K. now work in banking and financial management. We discussed the results of this survey at the Presidents Forum at the last IAA meeting, and further discussions will continue on how to position actuaries worldwide to be valuable employees in banking and investment organizations.

Halfway around the world in Australia, our colleagues are known for being a little more relaxed and having "no worries." However, I see a hotbed of ideas that are germinating from some very busy actuaries and regulators. The Aussies have been deriving distributions of liability outcomes for a number of years in order to calculate required central estimates and risk margins for both claims and premiums. They also are experimenting with other new regulatory requirements in interesting ways. Beginning this year, not only do their Approved Actuaries need to

complete Liability Valuation Reports, similar to U.S. reserve opinions, but also a much broader Financial Condition Report, with many additional analyses and assessments including:

- Current and future capital adequacy and a discussion of the insurer's approach to capital management;
- Asset and liability management, including the insurer's investment strategy;
- The suitability and adequacy of reinsurance arrangements; and
- The suitability and adequacy of the (overall) risk management framework.

No wonder so many of their actuarial students are now choosing the general insurance career path!

Similarly, our Canadian colleagues have been using dynamic capital adequacy testing for over a decade to meet requirements to report annually on insurers' future financial condition. This applies a series of integrated stress tests designed to mimic the financial impact of various adverse events on the insurer. Where possible to assess, the stress testing is done at a 99 percent confidence level.

In the U.K., our colleagues have led the way in using GLM and "external" data to analyze risks in more detail than has been traditionally done in the U.S. With a flurry of activity in recent years under the label of predictive modeling, U.S. actuaries are working to catch up.

I could cite many more examples, but it has been a long morning and I trust you see my point. Communication and joint activities with other casualty or general insurance actuaries throughout the world can significantly benefit us all by advancing our science faster, by opening doors to new areas of activity, by learning from experiments with other regulatory and accounting models, and, in my experience, by offering U.S. actuaries the invaluable opportunity to interact with other cultures.

We were fortunate to start the year with a very strong organization, and we finished with a very strong organization. I am happy to report that we have maintained financial soundness while keeping dues relatively low compared to other actuarial societies. But more importantly, we have maintained the spirit of volunteerism that is the real glue that makes the CAS such a successful organization. I mentioned earlier our 1,400 volunteers. Among them are 1,177 Fellows, or 43% of our Fellows! This is an incredible rate of volunteerism that far exceeds the typical rate for similar organizations.

In sum, I am very pleased with our accomplishments this year. I would like to thank my Executive Council—Tom, Amy, Beth, Cynthia, Debbie, Joanne, Jim, John, and Roger. You were an outstanding group who shared your opinions and supported each other, and worked extremely hard.

Our office staff also deserves our gratitude for their hard work to serve our membership in such an efficient manner. For example, I was very impressed by the ability of the team to move our office to a new location this year on schedule, under budget, and with no disruptions whatsoever.

I also thank my sons, Adam and Mark, for giving up a piece of their father and for sharing this adventure by each attending one of our major meetings.

And I can't give enough thanks to my wonderful wife Nancy for all her support and understanding this year. Yes, honey, we made it through.

I would like to close with a simple, but elegant equation from Albert Einstein, who said in 1950 "If *A* is success in life, then *A* equals *x* plus *y* plus *z*. Work is *x*; *y* is play; and *z* is keeping your mouth shut." It is now time for me to offer you some "*z*."

Thank you for your kind attention, and I don't know how to thank you enough for the privilege of serving as your president! Please take the opportunity at this meeting to keep learning!

# REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT—ADMINISTRATION

This report provides a one-year summary of Casualty Actuarial Society activities since the 2005 CAS Annual Meeting. I will first comment on these activities as they relate to the organization's purposes as stated in the CAS constitution:

- 1. Advance the body of knowledge of actuarial science applied to property, casualty, and similar risk exposures;
- 2. Establish and maintain standards of qualifications for membership;
- 3. Promote and maintain high standards of conduct and competence for the members; and
- 4. Increase the awareness of actuarial science.

I will then provide a summary of other activities that may not relate to a specific purpose, but are critical to the ongoing vitality of the CAS. Finally, I will summarize the current status of our finances and key membership statistics.

#### CAS ACTIVITIES

# 1. Advance the body of knowledge of actuarial science applied to property, casualty, and similar risk exposures.

The CAS Web Site provides a powerful tool for achieving this goal. In mid-2006, the Committee on Online Services unveiled a Web site redesign featuring improved search tools and new menu items on the home page allowing visitors to quickly find the information they need. With the "MyCAS" feature, registered users can tailor their own CAS homepage to deliver the content that interests them most. In conjunction with the redesign, the CAS also launched a new online tool, the Database of Actuarial Research Enquiry, or DARE, that helps users to better locate actuarial research articles. These improvements serve not only CAS members but the growing number of visitors to the CAS Web Site.

In 2006 the CAS also made significant progress in developing its new peer-reviewed scientific journal, *Variance*. The Publications Implementation Task Force selected the journal name and design, and created marketing and development strategies. The Journal Editorial Board performed the essential task of cultivating papers for publication and seeing them through initial screening, peer review, revisions, and full acceptance. *Variance* is scheduled to launch its premier issue in spring 2007. The *Proceedings of the Casualty Actuarial Society*, now part of a combined publication with the CAS *Yearbook*, still records the yearly activities of the Society but no longer publishes the peer-reviewed papers on actuarial science.

Publishing the *Forum* provides significant means for advancing the body of knowledge of actuarial science. The 2006 Winter *Forum* includes Data Management call papers and reports of two CAS Research Working Parties: Correlations and Dependencies Among All Risk Sources; and Risk Transfer Testing. The 2006 Fall *Forum* contains the Reserves call papers. Both issues of the *Forum* include several unsolicited working papers.

In regard to working papers, the CAS Executive Council reviewed and accepted the suggestions contained in the eForum Task Force Report. The report recommends creating a working paper repository on the CAS Web Site to allow authors to expose ideas and works in progress and to get feedback as they work towards writing papers for publication. The report also calls for creating additional e-mail lists for research-focused discussions that would advance actuarial science and its practice.

#### 2. Establish and maintain standards of qualifications for membership.

In October 2006 the CAS Board of Directors issued the White Paper on CAS Education Strategy. Developed after years of research and discussion, the White Paper articulates the board's proposed strategy for future CAS education, which will have significant implications for both basic education requirements for membership and continuing professional development. The board believes that it is critical to gather input from the stakeholders in the CAS education

process before implementing the strategy and encourages the submission of comments. These stakeholders include members, candidates, employers, educators, regulators, and others. The board is actively soliciting member feedback on the White Paper through January 2007.

With the goal of instilling a policy of professional ethics in candidates for CAS membership, the CAS Board voted at the end of 2006 to adopt the proposed Code of Professional Ethics for Candidates. The purpose of the new code is to require actuarial candidates to adhere to the high standards of conduct, practice, and qualifications of the actuarial profession, thereby supporting the actuarial profession in fulfilling its responsibility to the public. The board also voted to adopt "Rules of Procedure for Disciplinary Actions Involving Candidates" and corresponding revisions to the charge of the Discipline Committee. All of these changes will become effective January 1, 2008.

#### 3. Promote and maintain high standards of conduct and competence of members.

Throughout the years, the CAS's continuing education programs and the Code of Professional Conduct have successfully fulfilled this purpose. The CAS provides educational opportunities through the publication of actuarial materials and the sponsorship of meetings and seminars. This year's education programs included the following:

Four limited attendance seminars were conducted in 2006: Loss Distributions, Reserve Variability, Introduction to ERM (online course), and Actuarial Professionalism. Two limited attendance reinsurance seminars were also conducted in 2006: Catastrophes and Risk Transfer.

#### 4. Increase the awareness of actuarial science.

The Casualty Actuarial Society, ERM Institute International, Ltd. (ERM-II), and the CAS/SOA Risk Management Section have released the results of a major research project titled "Enterprise Risk Management for Property-Casualty Insurance Companies." The research report identifies major risks associated with business operations for property/casualty insurance companies and constructs a conceptual ERM framework, one that can be applied to a range of industries, despite its focus on property-casualty insurers. A press release of the project's findings and a link to the report were issued to the insurance industry trade press.

The CAS Executive Council approved a request by the Joint CAS/SOA Committee on Minority Recruiting (renamed to the Committee on Actuarial Diversity) to include funding of \$17,500 for diversity initiatives in the CAS fiscal year 2007 budget. The committee works to promote the actuarial field among underrepresented minority groups that may not otherwise be exposed to the profession.

In June 2006 the CAS vice president-risk integration and ERM presented to the CAS Executive Council the action paper titled "Research on the Use of Actuarial Techniques to Analyze Bank Operational Risk." The research project has the potential to enhance the reputation of actuaries as enterprise risk analysis leaders beyond the insurance industry. The EC approved the action paper's recommendation and charged the vice president-risk integration and ERM with pursuing the study under the direction of the Joint CAS/SOA Risk Management Section. The Section will lead the project and provide funding.

Looking beyond North America, in August 2006, the vice president-international presented a well-received first draft of the "CAS International Strategy Document" at the executive council meeting. The document contained an international vision and several areas to be developed such as supporting CAS members working abroad, assisting with basic education, encouraging international participation by CAS members, and broadening the scope of continuing education as well as coordinating activities with other actuarial groups worldwide. Some of the proposed goals of the international vision include the following:

• Basic Education—build on the knowledge and network that currently exists, rather than recreate this framework in the various countries requesting assistance.

• International Participation—encourage participation in international research projects, primarily through ASTIN (Actuarial Studies In Non-life insurance) and encourage members' participation (including serving as speakers) at international actuarial seminars and forums; share CAS research with other actuarial associations, and facilitate the exchange of research through the CAS Web Site.

• Continuing Education—incorporate an international focus into CAS continuing education programs. The content for continuing education programs will reflect international developments including an outreach to non-North American audiences for attendance and participation in North American programs.

Discussions on international strategy continued in September 2006 at the CAS Board meeting, with the board concluding that further refinements are needed. The vice president-international and the rest of executive council will seek input from the CAS Long-Range Planning Committee and CAS members to refine the international strategy and draft a brief statement of CAS objectives.

#### ABOVE AND BEYOND ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS

The CAS awarded the 2006 Above and Beyond Achievement Award (ABAA) to Rudy Palenik, Richard Goldfarb, and Nancy Watkins. The ABAA recognizes one-time accomplishments occurring within the past two years by volunteers.

Rudy Palenik served as a volunteer on the Research Paper Classifier Project. Volunteers were asked to classify 25 articles in 60 days. Mr. Palenik, who has been on the committee since June 2005, has classified 3,069 abstracts with the new CAS Research Taxonomy as of June 2006.

Richard Goldfarb was recognized for his contributions to basic education. He serves as a consultant to the Syllabus Committee for Exam 8 and was primarily responsible for the creation of the detailed learning objectives for that exam. For the 2006 syllabus, he stepped in and filled a need for a comprehensive study note on valuation by writing a paper. He also delivered a study note on risk-adjusted performance measurement for inclusion on the 2007 syllabus.

Nancy Watkins was honored for her work with a project of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners (NAIC), which she coordinated in her role as chair of Committee on Property and Liability Financial Reporting (COPLFR). In April 2005 the NAIC P&C Reinsurance Study Group needed assistance in identifying what tests of risk transfer were currently being done and what a minimum standard for risk transfer should be. Watkins took the lead and developed an action plan and a set of deliverables, agreeing to provide them by the end of August 2005.

#### **MEMBERSHIP STATISTICS**

Membership growth continued with 236 new Associates and 157 new Fellows. The total number of members as of November 2006 was 4,361, up five percent from the previous year.

#### GOVERNANCE

Chris Carlson was elected president elect for 2006–2007. CAS Fellows also elected Brian Brown, Chuck Bryan, Mary D. Miller, and Joanne Spalla to the CAS Board of Directors. Thomas G. Myers assumed the presidency. Due to Mr. Carlson leaving his board appointment early to serve as the president-elect, the board appointed Eugene Connell to complete Mr. Carlson's one year of remaining service on the board. The appointment was ratified by members at the 2006 Annual Meeting.

In balloting conducted from August 1 to September 1, 2006, the CAS Board of Directors proposed several changes to the CAS Constitution and Bylaws that would alter the governance of the Society. The Fellows of the Society voted to approve the proposal allowing the CAS to add up to three additional board members to the CAS Board of Directors, including nonactuaries, with the board choosing the additional members. The three appointees will be in addition to the 12 elected members and three ex officio members (the president-elect, the president, and the immediate past president). Proposals involving the expansion of CAS Associates' rights failed to garner the necessary support of the Fellows in the 2006 balloting, however. The proposals would have allowed Associates who have been members for at least five years to vote, to stand for election to the board of directors, and to hold certain officer positions (with the exception of the president, president-elect, vice president-admissions).

Along with the changes to the make-up of the board, the Fellows approved the proposal to designate the CAS Executive Director as an official member of the CAS Executive Council. Joining Executive Director Cynthia R. Ziegler on the 2007 CAS Executive Council are the following board-elected vice presidents: Kenneth Quintilian, vice president-administration; James K. Christie, vice president-admissions; Amy S. Bouska, vice president-international; Patricia Teufel, vice president-marketing and communications; Andrew E. Kudera, vice president-professional education; Roger M. Hayne, vice president-research and development; and John J. Kollar, vice president-risk integration and enterprise risk management. The CAS Executive Council met either by telephone or in person at least once a month during the year (except September) to discuss day-to-day and long-range operations.

The revised Constitution and Bylaws became effective on September 5, 2006, and are available on CAS Web Site and are included in this publication.

#### FINANCIAL STATUS

The CPA firm Langan Associates PC examined the CAS books for fiscal year 2006 and the CAS Audit Committee will report the firm's findings to the CAS Board of Directors in March 2007. The fiscal year ended with an audited net loss of \$185,933 compared to a budgeted net loss of \$90,170.

The CAS surplus now stands at \$3,539,619. This represents a decrease in surplus of \$185,933 over the amount reported last year. In addition to the net loss from operations of \$500,168, there was interest and dividend revenue of \$150,767, a realized gain of \$331,963 and an unrealized loss of \$168,495. There was also a total net increase of \$61,537 in various research, prize, and scholarship accounts (including the CAS Trust) arising from the difference between incoming funds and interest earned less expenditures, and a favorable adjustment to the CAS pension liability. These amounts are not reflected in the net revenue from operations. Total Members' Equity (CAS surplus plus non-surplus accounts) now stands at \$4,030,871, an overall decrease of \$124,396 over last year.

For 2006–2007, the CAS Board of Directors has approved a budget of approximately \$7.4 million. Members' dues for next year will be \$375, an increase of \$10, and fees for the Subscriber Program will increase \$10 to \$445. A \$45 discount is available to members and subscribers who elect to receive the *Forum* and *Discussion Paper Program* in electronic format from the CAS Web Site.
